Sandyston Receives Grants from NJ Department of Transportation



In October 2021, Sandyston Township was awarded a NJ Department of Transportation, Municipal Aid grant in the amount of

\$165,100 for Flatbrook Road Section V. This grant will continue paving on Flatbrook Road where the last project was completed in the Fall.

Thank you to Harold E. Pellow & Associates, who work on our behalf in applying for the State of New Jersey, Department of Transportation Grants.

Sandyston Receives Local Recreation Improvement Grant

On January 5, 2022, Sandyston Township received word we were awarded a \$70,000 Local Recreation Improvement Grant through the Department of Community Affairs, Division of Local Government Services. This grant will be put toward the construction of a walking path behind the municipal building around the ballfield, soccer field and playground. Sandyston Township Recreation has been working hard to raise funds for this project and funds they have raised to date will be used to supplement this walking path with pavers (see fundraiser), benches, signage and trees.

Local Recreation Improvement Grant funds were awarded to successful grant applicants to help cover costs associated with updating community centers, playgrounds, pools, fields, walking or bicycle trails, rail trails, multi-sport courts, and recreational facilities; one-time personnel costs directly related to improvements; project development professional services costs; equipment costs including playground and recreation facilities equipment; and environmental remediation costs required to prepare recreation sites for use.

Remember to provide spay/neuter information & valid rabies certificate with an expiration date of at least November 1, 2022 (per State of New Jersey). Dog licenses fees \$13 unaltered/\$10 altered.

Remediation Investigation Grant Received For Fri-State Steel Fabricator

As reported in previous newsletters, Sandyston Township is in the process of determining the extent of the contamination of Tri-State Steel Fabricators with a grant approved through the Department of Environ-



mental Protection, Hazardous Discharge Site Remediation Program and the New Jersey Department of Economic Development. The previous Supplemental Remedial Investigation in the amount of \$43,147.50 has been completed and we have applied for another Supplemental Remedial Investigation. These investigations are funded 100% through a grant provided by the New Jersey Economic Development Authority.

At the conclusion of these investigations, the Township Committee will be provided with costs and steps necessary for remediation, as well as options and grants available for remediation of this site with a possible sale to Green Acres.

The investigation is ongoing at this time.

"No National Park"

What Does This Mean?



You may be seeing "No National Park" signs around Sandyston Township directing you to a "No National Park" Facebook page, but what does this mean?

In 2014, the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area released *Vision*

2030: A Vision for a Sustainable Future outlining their vision of the recreation area. At that time, the Township Committee passed a resolution entitled "R-19-2015 Opposing Specific Proposals of the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area "Vision 2030". One of several proposals was the idea of the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area being changed to a park/preserve.


Now, seven years, later that same idea is being pushed by the New Jersey and Pennsylvania Sierra Club's seeking to change the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area to the Delaware Valley National Park and Lenape Preserve. It is important to advise that at this time, there is no formal proposal, there is no information as to the economical, agricultural or environmental impact to Sandyston, the infrastructure, where the "Lenape Preserve' would be located, size or how it will be managed, entry fees charged and how fees would be collected, and more unanswered questions. A change like this would require an Act of Congress and we are aware of no current legislative activity on this matter at the congressional level. But, it is very important that we stay informed on this issue.

Once again, the Township Committee has passed a resolution, on March 22, 2022, entitled "R-26-2022 Opposing the Proposal by the New Jersey and Pennsylvania Sierra Club to Change the Designation of the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area to the Delaware Valley National Park and Lenape Preserve Until a Formal Plan is Presented for Public Review and Comment". We have sent this resolution to our legislators at every level, agencies, municipalities and more to make our voice heard.

Always remember you are welcome to contact the members of the Township Committee to discuss your concerns and ask questions or attend monthly Township meetings. As information becomes available, we will provide information on the Township website and Facebook page as it becomes available.

The "No National Park" Facebook page has been created by concerned citizens where news and information is made available on their efforts to provide as much information as they can to the public. As always, it is a personal decision where you stand on the issue.

Optimum/Altice Agrees To Bring Cable to Residents of Struble Road



One thing that became abundantly clear during the COVID pandemic is the reality that cable/internet service and connectivity is a major issue in New Jersey. Sandyston

Township is no different. While most roads in Sandyston have cable, there are a few roads that still do not and must use satellite or phone for cable and internet—and speeds are dismal at best.

In the Fall, Mayor Harper took these concerns to Altice with the hope that funds we received from the American Rescue Act could be used toward getting cable to the residents of Struble Road. To our surprise, Altice agreed to bring cable to Struble Road at no cost to the residents/municipality. While their projected date of completion has come and gone, they are still working to finalize necessary permits to install required telephone poles to complete the installation of the cable.

As with any project, it takes time to submit the permits required and delays with approvals are very common. We are continuing to work with Altice to see this project through to completion.

Clean Communities Mission Schedule A Road Clean Up



Sandyston Township is looking for local organizations to organize a road clean up. Each participating organization will be paid \$250 per road clean up.

Sandyston Township will provide gloves, vests, road sign and garbage bags. Local organizations must provide a minimum of 15 participants to be eligible for the funds and a few papers need to be filled out logging participants, roads cleaned and garbage collected. Are You A Landlord?

Did You File Your Landlord Registration with the Municipal Clerk?

Please be reminded, New Jersey Landlord Registration Act—New Jersey Landlord Identity Law—N.J.S.A. 46:8-27 thru 37, requires landlords who rent (NON-OWNER OCCUPIED) houses, apartments, or buildings to register certain information with the Municipal Clerk of the town where the building is located. You may download a form from the following link:

Smoke Detector & Carbon Monoxide Alarm/Fire Extinguisher Inspection Required By Law



Please be advised, when you sell your home or each time the tenant changes in your rental, you are required to have a Smoke Detector & Carbon Monoxide Alarm/Fire Extinguisher inspec-

tion and required to verify the presence of properly dated smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors, verifying they are installed and in working condition, as well as verifying the presence of a fire extinguisher near the kitchen. The application fee is:

\$50 10 business days prior to change of occupant 4 to 10 business days prior to change of occu-

pant

\$125 giving fewer than 4 business days prior to change of occupant

\$40 Reinspection Fee

Pool Permits Required! Important Information



In January 2008, the definition of a swimming pool changed. The definition was changed which defines a swimming pool as ANY structure intended for

swimming or recreational bathing that can hold <u>24 inches</u> or more in depth. This includes in-ground, above and onground pools, hot tubs and spas.

This definition includes the commonly used "inflatable pool" that is 24 inches or more in depth. Zoning and construction permits are required.

If you recently installed a swimming pool and have not received a Zoning Permit, Construction Permit, necessary inspections and a Certificate of Approval please contact the construction department immediately to avoid violations/fines.

Safety is Priority! If you currently have a permit for a swimming pool, you must contact the Construction Office to schedule your final inspection **BEFORE** you plan on using your pool.

Ladders for above or on-ground pools are very tricky and specific—be sure to talk to the Construction Official before you purchase or to confirm the one you purchase is to code for New Jersey.

Can Emergency Services Find Your Home?



It is extremely important that emergency services can find your home in cases of emergency. Per Sandyston Township Code, Chapter 47 "Buildings, Numbering of", as well as N.J.S.A 40:23-50, residents are required to have a VISIBLE house number by the road for 911 emergencies during daytime and evening hours.

If you live on a private road and the residents mailboxes are all at the end of the road, make sure your physical property is properly marked and is clearly visible. Also be sure your **ROAD NAME SIGN is clearly visible.

If you need a reflective road sign for your property, a form can be found on the Township website.

Do I Need A Permit?? Contact the Construction Official

Zoning Approval and Construction Permits are required for certain types of installations, remodeling, renovations and repairs around your home. If you are unsure if you need zoning approval or a construction permit, please contact the Construction Department and speak to the Construction Official, Robert Huber, who will provide you with the information and forms necessary.

Zoning approval and construction permits are required for tank installations and removals (propane or oil), deck installation and repairs, additions, remodeling/alteration of rooms, electrical and plumbing work, woodstoves, pellet stoves, gas appliances, sheds, pole barns, air conditioning and generator installation, furnace replacement, water heater replacement, pools (all kinds), hot tubs and more. To be sure a permit is/is not needed please call!

Please remember, realtors and potential homebuyers check for permits to be sure the work was done to code!

Doing the work yourself? That's great! But if you are using a contractor, be sure to have that contractor fill out, seal (if required) and sign the permit. If you have a contractor, but fill out the permit under your name—you have no recourse should a problem arise!

Your home is a huge investment—be sure to protect your investment and ensure the safety of your family by making sure to take out a permit!



Farmland Assessment Packet What You Need To Know



Please note the 2023 Farmland Assessment Packets for qualified farms are generally mailed out in the beginning of June. Keep an eye out for the BRIGHT YELLOW ENVELOPE containing your farmland forms. If you did not receive the forms, contact Kathy DeKorte, Tax Assessor, at 973-948-3520 x203.

The statutory deadline to return your completed farmland paperwork to the Tax Assessor is **Monday**, **August 1, 2022**.

NO EXCEPTIONS!!!

Be sure to read the letter from the Tax Assessor regarding receipts, maps and tax forms.

Please fill out <u>ALL</u> sections on <u>BOTH</u> sides. Remember:

- The amount of acreage in Section 1, Line 6 must equal Section 2, line 8.
- In Section 2, line 4 is only reported when in a woodland management or forest stewardship plan. You cannot use sales of woodland products for income without a woodland management plan in place.
- The sum of lines 1-4 must be at least 5 acres in order to qualify. Line 5 must be less than or equal to lines 1-3.

The municipal building is open from 8:30 am to 2:00 pm (unless otherwise posted) for you to drop off paperwork in person.



You may also drop off your paperwork in the green drop box located to the left of the municipal building front doors (see photo, secured to the building, under video surveillance, checked daily).

Please do not wait until the last minute to fill out your paperwork and return it to the Tax Assessor.



The Department of Environmental Protection has a toll-free telephone hotline number you can use to report environmental incidents, abuses, and complaints in New Jersey. The **1-877-WARNDEP** number can be used in the continental United States.

You may use this hotline to report incidents like wetland dumping, protected stream encroachment, dumping garbage, illegal burning or incidents with bears.

To report life-threatening and/or environmental emergencies, call 9-1-1, local police or the DEP Hotline.



Don't Get SCAMMED!!!



DON'T FALL FOR JCP & L SCAM



Sandyston Township would like to warn its businessowners and residents about a financial scam being perpetrated by individuals purporting to be representatives from Jersey Central Power and Light (JCP&L).

The scam is conducted as follows: An individual will contact a business or resident, usually via telephone, and state that their electric account is past due and that if they do not pay the delinquent amount within 30 minutes, their electric will be turned off. The caller has the JCP&L account number and information. The

caller asks you to pay the amount due in pre-paid debit cards (such as Green Dot or MoneyPak cards). The caller instructs you to obtain the cards and to call back with the card numbers, so the caller will have immediate access to the funds. In some instances, the caller ID's actually makes it appear that the calls are coming from JCP&L. Once you call back and give the card numbers, you will not be able to get your money back. Often, once the scam was successful the first time, you may be targeted a second time with the same threat—that more money was due and that if not paid, the electric will be shut off.

JCP&L will not call or email to demand immediate payment or threaten an imminent shutoff of electric service. JCP&L will not demand payment via pre-paid debit cards. JCP & L will send all delinquent bills via mail (unless you have chosen to receive paperless billing through JCP & L specifically. HANG UP THE PHONE!

JCP & L urges any customer who has doubts about a call from someone claiming to be from JCP&L, especially one demanding immediate payment, to call JCP&L's customer service number at 1-800-662-3115. JCP&L has an informative website to assist consumers with recognizing scams and on-line reporting. DON'T FALL FOR FBI SPOOFING SCAM

Fraudsters claiming to be FBI agents are calling people at random and telling them they're being investigated for certain federal violations. The victim is told if they don't pay a fee immediately, they'll be arrested. The call seems legitimate because the scammer spoofs the local FBI field office phone number and it displays that way on caller ID.

Warning: This is a scam!

The FBI does **NOT** call or email private citizens to demand money or threaten arrests. If you're contacted by someone claiming to be with the FBI, verify the information with the Bureau. If you believe you're a victim of a phone or online scam, file an online complaint with the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center.

WHAT IS SMISHING?

There's a new type of scam you definitely need to be worried about called "smishing," or SMS phishing.

This new texting scam looks so legitimate, anyone could fall victim to it. Scammers are spoofing banks' phone numbers and sending text messages to customers. A spoofed phone number hides the actual number the text is coming from and displays a number from a trusted source, like your bank.

The text claims your debit card has been used to make a purchase and if you don't recognize the transaction, you need to call their fraud prevention helpline. A phone number is provided.

Warning: This is not a legitimate bank phone number! Call the bank, confirm the status and delete the text!

Because the incoming text looks like it's from your bank, people are falling for this. If you *do* call the number provided in the text, the fraudster will answer the phone. They will then ask you to confirm your sensitive banking details, allowing them to steal money from your account. **Contact your bank IMMEDIATELY**—never give out sensitive information.

Tax News, Deadlines & Information



Tax Payment Information

- You may reach the Tax Collector by calling 973-948-3520, extension 202. Please call anytime to leave a message and the Tax Collector will promptly return your call. Check the website for days and times the Tax Collector will be in the office.
- Tax payments should be sent to: Sandyston Township, c/o Tax Collector, 133 Route 645, Sandyston, NJ 07826, or you may drop off your tax payments at the Sandyston Township Municipal Building during the tax collectors hours. Checks should be made payable to "Sandyston Township". Please include all tax stubs for taxes you are paying and a return envelope for any papers you wish returned.
- If you wish to pay for your taxes in cash, you must see the Tax Collector directly during her office hours.
- Payments requiring a receipt must be accompanied by the entire tax bill with a self-addressed stamped envelope. The Tax Collector is the only township employee that may issue a receipt for taxes paid.
- Taxes are due February 1, May 1, August 1 and November 1 of each year. Sandyston Township does permit a 10 day grace period. Taxes not paid by November 10 are subject to tax sale.
- All tax payments are due in the tax office on the 10th day by the end of the business day to avoid interest. If the 10th falls on a weekend or holiday, the grace period is extended to the next business day.
- Postdated checks <u>will not be accepted</u> and will be promptly returned to the taxpayer. This could delay timely payment of your taxes so be sure to properly date your check.
- Interest on delinquent taxes is 8% per annum on the first \$1,500 of the delinquency and 18% per annum in excess of \$1,500. If delinquent taxes in excess of \$10,000 remain at the end of the year, a penalty of 6% will be charged.
- Absence of a tax bill does not negate your tax responsibilities.
 Tax due dates never change.
- Did you pay off your mortgage/refinance? If yes, please advise the Tax Collector so the change can be made in our computer system. Use the "Advice Copy" to pay your taxes.
- The Tax Collector is not responsible for any tax payment that is lost in the mail. If by chance your taxes get lost in the mail, you are still responsible for the tax payment and any interest incurred. You may check the status of your taxes online or call the tax collector to check to make sure your tax payment has been received.
- Take a minute and check for any deductions you should be receiving on your tax bill and contact the Tax Assessor should you notice a problem or have a question.
- Please be advised that the State of New Jersey does not allow the Tax Collector to acknowledge postmarks when you mail your tax payment, therefore, taxes must be received in the office on or before the 10th of the month taxes are due. Failure to receive a tax bill does not exempt you from paying your taxes or the interest due on delinquent taxes.
- Make sure your mailing address is correct.
- Before you mail your check, be sure to check it over. Make sure the date, amounts, written word and signature are all in place.

Senior Citizens Annual Property Tax Deduction

Annual deduction of \$250 from property taxes levied on a dwelling house owned and occupied by Senior Citizens age 65 or older; persons permanently and totally disabled; and surviving spouses age 55 or older of an already receiving senior citizen; all of whom must meet the annual income requirement of \$10,000 or less (excluding Social Security/ Disability benefits). Applications may be picked up at the municipal building.

Veterans Annual Deduction



Annual deduction of up to \$250 from taxes due on the real or personal property of qualified war veterans and their unmarried surviving spouse/surviving civil union partners/surviving domestic partners.

The veteran must meet all requirements of New Jersey citizenship and legal or domiciliary

residence in the State, property ownership, active wartime service in the U.S. Armed Forces, and honorable discharge as of October 1 of the pretax year to receive the deduction for the following tax year. Applications may be picked up at the municipal building and questions can be directed to Kathleen Kieb, Tax Assessor.

Tax Information Available Online

Wondering if you paid your taxes? Was your payment received by the Tax Collector. Now you can get real time tax information anytime of the day by visiting:

Insert your Block/Lot <u>or</u> Last Name (less is more) and get up to date tax information. When using the Street Address option, try to use abbreviations (RD, LN, TRL, ST).

All information provided is subject to verification by the Tax Collector.

Tax Sale What You Need To Know

All delinquent tax payments not received by November 10 each year are subject to Tax Sale.

If you have a delinquent tax balance after November 10, expect to receive delinquent notices until the delinquency is paid.

Should the delinquency remain unpaid into the following calendar year, the Tax Collector sets the date for the Tax Sale. The delinquent amounts are either sold and purchased by a lienholder or struck back to the municipality.

Important Things to Remember

- The Tax Collector prints and mails delinquent notices on a regular basis, and each one is dated with calculated interest to the date listed on the notice.
 Do not pay taxes from expired delinquent notices.
 - Check the amount owed online, or
 - Call the Tax Collector to verify the amount owed on the delinquency.
- Once the Tax Collector sets the date for the Tax Sale, the ability of the taxpayer to pay delinquent taxes using the online payment system is turned off. This is done because at this point payment must be made by cash, money order or certified funds and payment also includes current interest and cost of sale fees.
- Four weeks prior to the date of Tax Sale, if a delinquency remains your name will be in the newspaper. The Tax Collector will also mail two notices, two weeks prior to the date of the Tax Sale.
- Should you have a delinquency after November 10, and you make a tax payment do not assume that you are not still delinquent and in danger of Tax Sale. Should you continue to receive delinquent notices and you believe this is in error, contact the Tax Collector immediately. Request a paid receipt for your records to confirm the delinquency has been paid.
- Make sure you open mail from Sandyston Township. Do not assume it is not important. All too often residents neglect to open important information mailed from Sandyston Township, only to miss important deadlines or requests for information.
- The guidelines that the Tax Collector follows are per NJ State Statute. Sandyston Township offers many ways for residents to pay their taxes, deliver tax payments and check the status of taxes. Be sure to familiarize yourself with these options and should you have any questions do not ever hesitate to seek assistance.

Property Tax Reimbursement (Senior Freeze or "Blue Book")

The Senior Freeze Program reimburses eligible senior citizens and disabled persons for property tax on their principal residence. To qualify, you must meet all the eligibility requirements for each year from the base year through the application year (the current application year is 2021).

Applications were mailed in March to the last address you filed with. If you did not receive your booklet, contact our Senior Freeze Property Tax Reimbursement Information Line for assistance at 1-800-882-6597.

<u>Eligibility:</u> You or your spouse were (only one must meet requirement):

- 65 or older on December 31, 2020, or
- Actually receiving federal Social Security disability benefit payments (not benefit payments received on behalf of someone else) on or before December 31, 2020.

Residency: You lived in New Jersey continuously since December 31, 2010 as either a homeowner or a renter.

<u>Home Ownership</u>: You owned and lived in your home since December 31, 2017, or earlier (and you still owned and lived in that home on December 31, 2021).

Property Taxes: The 2020 property taxes due on your home must have been by paid by June 1, 2021 and the 2021 property taxes must be paid by June 1, 2022.

<u>Income Limit:</u> Your total annual income (combined if you were married or in a Civil Union and lived in the same house) was:

- 2020—\$92,969; and
- 2021—\$94,178 or less

Applications must be filed by October 31, 2022.

How To Apply: PTR-1

If you met the eligibility requirements for both 2020 & 2021 and are filing for the first time (or reapplying to the program after being denied in a prior year), file Form PTR-1 and the appropriate verification form (PTR-1A / PTR-1B).

PTR-2

If you filed an application for 2020 and met all the eligibility requirements, file Form PTR-2 and the appropriate <u>verification form</u> (PTR-2A / PTR-2B). Form PTR-2 is a personalized application that is not available online. If you qualify and have not received this application call <u>1-800-882-6597</u>. The verification form is your proof of property taxes due and paid. Alternate documents to send as proof can be found online.

To register to vote in New Jersey, you must:

- Be a United States Citizen;
- Be at least 18 years of age on or before the next election;
- Be a resident of your home county for at least 30 days before the next election



You may download a Voter Registration form from www.sussexcountyclerk.org, or pick one up in person at the Sussex County Board of Elections office, Sussex County Clerk's office, Sandyston Township Municipal Building or a Motor Vehicle Agency.

Voter Registration form may also be used for name and address changes, signature update, and Political Party Affiliation or Non-Affiliation Change

Important Dates to Remember

May 17, 2022 is the deadline to submit a Voter Registration for the Primary Election (21 days before election)

May 17, 2022 mandated evening Voter Registration available for Primary Election in offices of County Commissioners of Registration (21 days before election)

May 31, 2022 is the deadline to apply for a Mail-In Ballot by Mail for the Primary Election

June 3—5, 2022 Early Voting Period

<u>June 6, 2022 by 3:00 pm</u> deadline for In-Person Mail-In Ballot Applications for Primary Election

June 7, 2022 Primary Election 6:00 am to 8:00 pm

Vote Early In Person June 3-5, 2022

New Jersey voters have the option to vote early in person on voting machines at "Vote Centers" in their county. The three sites designated as Vote Centers in Sussex County are:

- ⇒ Sussex County Fairgrounds, Augusta
- ⇒ Sussex-Wantage Branch Library, Wantage
- ⇒ Louise Childs Branch Library, Hopatcong

The Early Voting period for the June 7, 2022 Primary Election is June 3 thru June 5, with the following hours: Friday & Saturday, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Sunday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Registered voters will receive a Sample Ballot in the mail 7-10 days before Election Day, which will provide address information for the Vote Centers, as well as voting hours.

NOTE! Voters who are scheduled to receive mail-in ballots will **not** be able to vote using a voting machine unless they first opt out of vote-by-mail.

Questions about polling sites and/or hours should be directed to the Sussex County **Board of Elections**. (Information per Sussex County Clerk website)

Sussex County consists of 119 voting districts and employs about 480 Poll Workers for each county-wide election (June and November). The day is usually 15 hours long, and is very rewarding because you are a vital part of the American Democratic process.

Poll Workers are usually placed in or near their home town and are paid \$200 per election. Solutions to Stormwater Pollution: Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water





Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes where our children play. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water. Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water. By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty. As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including

colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to storm-water pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties. As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides: Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer. Do not apply fertilizer if heavy rain is predicted. Look into alternatives for pesticides. Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer. If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow instructions on the label on how to correctly apply the product. Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products: Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints. Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated. If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance. Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible. Recycle used motor oil. Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.

Keep pollution out of storm drains: Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies. Do not let sewage or other waste flow into a stormwater system.

Don't litter: Place litter in trash receptacles. Recycle. Recycle. Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly: Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them. Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost. Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

Clean up after your pet: Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules. An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property. Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. Remember to use newspaper, bags or "scoopers" to pick up wastes. Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet. Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife: Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas. Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.
